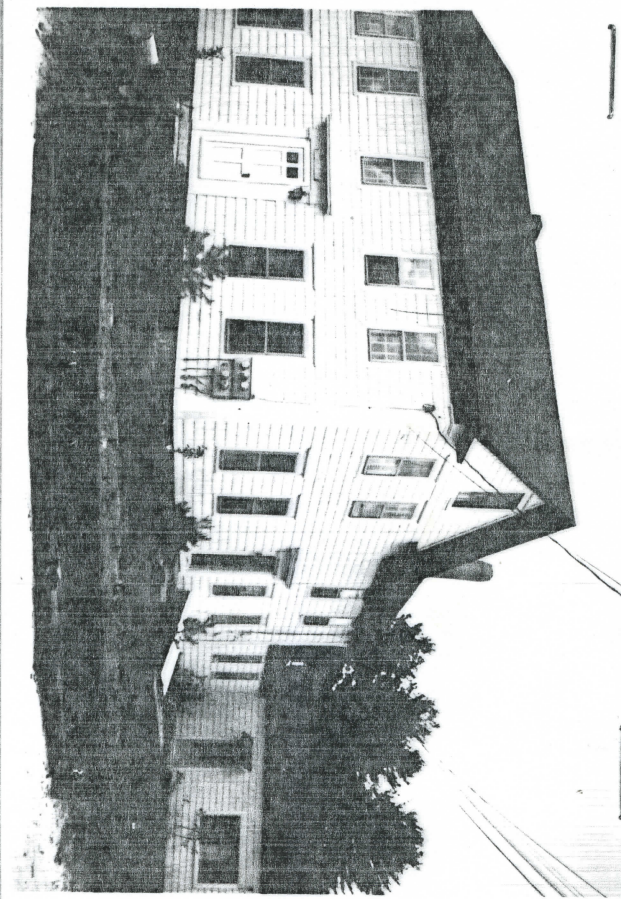

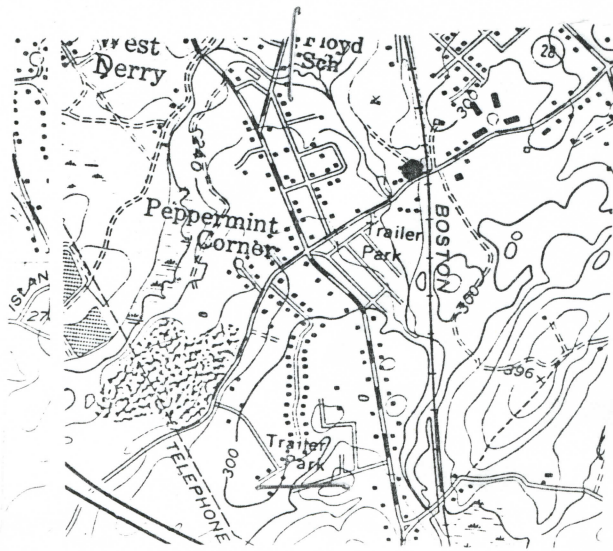

in style and was an important dairy farm in its day. The architecture of the house shows the transition of these 2 styles in its Federal proportions and granite foundation, its center entry flanked by pilasters supporting an entablature, 6/6 sash with thin Greek Revival style muntions and projecting eaves with cornice returns on the gable end. The large gambrel roofed barns are surmounted by a series of ventilators providing a startling agricultural profile in the center of town. The house is an important reminder of the early development of this section of Derry.
